My Two Shekels

In a few short weeks, we will once again be celebrating the holiday of Purim, a Jewish Mardi Gras of sorts, where we celebrate the triumph of good over evil, masquerade in costume, and give Mishloach Manot, gifts of food, to family and friends.

It is not a religious holiday, nor is God's name even mentioned in the story, yet Midrash Mishle 9:2 states, "When all the other festivals will be abolished (in messianic times), Purim will remain." Mah Nishtanah? What makes this holiday different from all other holidays? Perhaps because we can relate to the challenge of balancing assimilation while maintaining our commitment to our faith.

The Purim story is set in Persia, and even when Esther marries King Ahashverosh, she keeps her religious identity a secret. When told that her people face certain annihilation, however, she risks her life to come before the King and reveal that she is a Jew.

Luckily, things turn out well, and Esther is celebrated for her courage in helping rescue her fellow Jews. Maybe this story also resonates because we can understand, all too well, what it is like to be victimized by yet another racist, tyrannical madman. But this time the enemy – Haman – is executed on the gallows in which he hoped to murder the Jews.

Ironic twists and turns, hidden identities, a courageous Jewish heroine, a happy ending: it all adds up to one great story. But it is so much more than that.

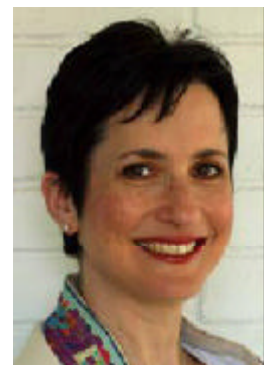
The Purim story reminds us that God can play just as important a part behind the scenes as God does front and center, in the miracles we've been recalling over the past weeks in the Book of Exodus. Does Esther just happen to be in the right place at the right time, or has God really orchestrated it? As Mordechai, Esther's cousin observes, "And who knows whether it was just for such a time as this that you attained the royal position!"

Purim is also an important reminder that, even when things look impossibly bleak, there is hope. And when we stand up for what we believe in, hold onto our faith and identity, and take charge of our destiny, we can, quite possibly and with God's help, change the course of history.

I invite all of you to come celebrate with us as we read highlights from the Megillah from a wonderful, family friendly Purim Megillah, adapted by Shoshana Silberman, the author of our family Siddur. Children will be reading a section from each chapter in English, after I chant in Hebrew, using the very special Trope used only for Megillat Esther.

Our sages tell us that one of the Mitzvot of Purim is to hear the Megillah read, so come rejoice with us on Saturday night, February 27th at 7:00pm. We'll begin with Havdallah, read the Megillah, and enjoy some Hamantashen as well!
Chag Purim Sameach – a joyous Purim!

From the President

A Caring Community

In my previous article, I talked about the vision that this board and the previous board has for Congregation Beth Shalom. We want to make Beth Shalom a warm and welcoming place.

We want Beth Shalom to be the place we turn to when we want to celebrate.

In December, the Union of Reform Judaism had a webinar (a live seminar conducted over the web) entitled "Where's My Caring Congregation?", which I attended. The webinar presentation along with a recording of the webinar can be found at the URJ's website <http://urj.org/learning/meetings/webinars/archive/>.

In this webinar, Rabbi Richard Address, the Caring Community Specialist for the URJ talked about creating a Kehillat Chesed, a caring community. One of the key points the webinar made was that creating a Kehillat Chesed was something that had to be done by the entire congregation. A culture of Kehillat Chesed must be created. I want to try and implement this program here at Congregation Beth Shalom.



Why? Because we are a family

We may not know where we are theologically or religiously, but we know we are a family. We might have disagreements from time to time, as all families do, but we need to remember that even though we may have disagreements, we all want the same thing. For Congregation Beth Shalom to be a warm and loving place that its membership turns to in times of joy and in times of sorrow.

Sometimes we do this well. When the congregation came together and held a Friday night service in Richard Cook's (OBM) room in the hospice wing of Arlington Memorial, I was so proud to say I was a member of Congregation Beth Shalom. Sometimes we don't do so well. I'm sure all of us know of times when things "fell through the cracks."

We will do better. The webinar pointed to many resources on the URJ website to help a congregation implement that culture. Specifically there is a "how to" brochure at the URJ's website <http://urj.org/life/community/101/>. One of the key points in the webinar, however, was to "Democratize the Mitzvah." This means that it's everyone's responsibility to help create a Kehillat Chesed, a Caring Community.

Let's do this together.

Such local programs/organizations as our award-winning Camp Impact, Jewish Family Services, Tarrant County synagogues (including nearly \$9,000 for Beth Shalom), UNT Jewish Studies program, Melton Adult Mini School, BBYO, Jewish War Veterans, and other local programs, are funded by the Annual Campaign. In fact, 50% of the allocable dollars raised in Tarrant County stay in Tarrant County.

The other 50% is used to fund regional and national agencies, including university programs (Hillel), birthright Israel, Jewish Children's Regional Service, to name just a few. The largest portion (\$261,000) of our allocable funds from the campaign was sent overseas to fund programs of the Jewish Agency and the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, aiding needy Jews in Israel and around the world.

Retaining a sense of Jewishness

Its time for the post Chanukah blahs. There are no decent Jewish books to read or review. Nor any music, magazines, comic books, or deep religious tracts.

We have just gone through a month in which every day we were exposed to Rudolph, or Frosty, or Charlie Brown's pathetic tree, or Charles Dickens story told from the earliest 1930s version to 1960s version to modern interpretations and revisions of his story ad nauseum.

My mind was about to explode until I flipped on TV this week and saw a movie I hadn't seen since 1982: *The Chosen*. This movie comes from the book of the same name written by Chaim Potok in 1996. Although the book is much better and deeper than the movie, sitting down and watching a Jewish themed movie as the holiday season came to a close was a breath of fresh air.

Basically it is the story of two boys: one a young Chassid (Robbie Benson) whose father (Rod Steiger) is the great and wise Torah scholar for the community. The other is a modern Orthodox student (Barry Miller) who has been forced into a friendship after being injured in a baseball accident.

This is a story of faith, fathers, friendship and human frailty. Two seeming similar Jewish boys living in the shadow of the Holocaust find they have nothing in common. But it is their differences that make this such a wonderful movie.

Seeing this again was a good cleansing of the palate, a fresh start for a new year of yiddishkeit.

Views from Kabbalah:

Kabbalistic Music

Rabbi Yehuda Ashlag (Baal HaSulam), author of the Sulam commentary of The Zohar, expressed his spiritual feelings through the words of his numerous published writings. Among them he wrote songs and composed melodies based on these spiritual feelings.

The music itself is based on the way a person feels in the spiritual world. What is so special about the music is that everyone can understand it, even if he has not reached the composer's spiritual level. Listening to Baal HaSulam's music, as conveyed by his son Rabbi Baruch Ashlag, we have the opportunity to experience the spiritual sentiments of these prominent Kabbalists.

The Kabbalist achieves two polarized stages in spirituality: agony, as a result of drifting away from the Creator and delight as a result of getting closer to Him. The feeling of drifting away from the Creator produces sad music expressed by a prayer appealing for closeness. The feeling of closeness to the Creator produces joyous music, expressed by a prayer of thanksgiving.

Therefore, we hear and feel two distinct moods in the music: longing and desire for unification when drifting away, and love and happiness when discovering unification. The two moods together express the Kabbalist's unification with the Creator.

The music bathes the listener in a wondrous light. We do not need to know anything about it before listening to it, since it is wordless. Yet its effect on our hearts is direct and swift. Hearing it over and over again is a special experience.

The notes are composed in adherence to Kabbalistic rules. The notes are chosen according to the way man's soul is formed. The listener feels them penetrating deep within his soul, unobstructed. This happens because of the direct connection between our souls and the roots of the notes.

Mezuzot in Space

Jewish Astronaut Posts Mezuzah on NASA Shuttle Door Posts

The mezuzah, a religious object used by nomadic Israelites wandering in the desert 4000 years ago, is being used by an American Jewish astronaut on his travels into outer space in 2008.

Gregory Chamitoff will place mezuzahs (sic) on the door post near his bunk aboard NASA's Discovery shuttle. Chamitoff says the mezuzahs will serve as constant reminders of his home and of his Jewish identity during his six-month-long stay on the International Space Station.

NASA allows its astronauts to carry a small pouch with a limited number of personal articles from close family and friends, thus enabling these people to share in the space flight experience with the astronaut. The mezuzahs were given to Chamitoff by his former aerospace teacher Phil Hattis and close friend Lisa Stone. Hattis and Stone chose unique space-shuttle shaped mezuzahs designed by Israeli artist Laura Cowan.

"Since Greg and I share a Jewish heritage and I wanted to pick a personal artifact that my family could appreciate for a long time, a mezuzah made sense as something that could become part of the home after returning to Earth. Furthermore, while Greg is in space, it can be a part of his temporary home," said Hattis.

Stone said "It seems very appropriate to have a mezuzah that evokes space flight actually go into space."

While Hattis chose Cowan's Apollo Mezuzah, Stone chose the Shuttle Mezuzah. Cowan says she creates rocket-shaped mezuzahs because "I love the idea of using a modern symbol to make an ancient religious law feel contemporary."

God commands the Jewish people to hang mezuzahs, which contain verses from the Torah, on their door posts. "And you shall inscribe these words upon the doorposts of your house and upon your gates." (Deuteronomy 6:4-9 and 11:13-21). I wonder if even the greatest Jewish minds - from Rambam to Einstein - ever imagined that one day these words would be inscribed on the door post of a space shuttle.
